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Begin Your Career Exploration

Congratulations! You have started pharmacy school and now begin the journey from pharmacy student to pharmacy practitioner. The next few years will be filled with bittersweet endings and new beginnings, but don't worry because ASHP has many resources to help with the transition. Every journey will be different, but below you will find helpful resources to explore practice areas and the variety of career opportunities that your degree will prepare you for. Below are some quick tips to begin your career exploration as a P1-P3:

- Shadow pharmacists working in various practice settings
- Gain experience by working as a pharmacy technician or pharmacy intern
- Explore careers in health-system pharmacy with Career Profiles
- Apply for summer internships, including the <u>ASHP Summer Internship Program</u> (Deadline December 31)
- Consider elective courses in your areas of interest
- Research residency options for post-graduation through the <u>ASHP Residency Directory</u>
- Align P4 rotations around your practice interests and, if able, schedule post-graduate interest area experiences before the Midyear Clinical Meeting
 - Apply for unique APPE rotations to diversify your pharmacy-based experiences
 - International, industry, government agencies, association management, other electives
 - Apply for the <u>ASHP APPE Experiential Education Program</u>, applications are accepted on a rolling basis
 - Make the most of your APPE experiences
- Listen to the wisdom and experiences of senior students at your School or College of Pharmacy
- Get involved with professional organizations at the school, state, and national level.

Professional Development

- Build and regularly update your <u>CV</u>

 - Get involved at the local, state, and national levels

- Volunteer as a student teaching assistant in a classroom or lab or mentor other students
